St Mary's Junior Seminary: With continuing proceeds from maize processing equipment that ZOA financed in 2001, ZOA covers about half the secondary school tuition and maintenance of over forty orphaned students and provides a useful service to 300-400 women farmers in the area.

Monze Mission Hospital: Through a grant to set up a poultry project, ZOA supplemented the income of fifteen households headed by teenaged orphans. With additional support, about 700 children are now fed.

Twapia Transient Home: ZOA supported housing and maintenance for about forty-five orphans while permanent homes were sought and provided food, health care and educational requisites for a further twenty-eight in 2004.

Limulunga Projects : ZOA provided the garden and classrooms for the pre-school program of about fifty orphans. When the six-year-olds complete the first grade, they are now admitted to the public school system. A new program will soon conduct workshops in Lozi on Grieving for the children and their caregivers. In a further program at Namushakende for Infants at Risk, ZOA supports the health clinic with medications and food for sixty malnourished infants who are orphaned or whose mothers have AIDS.

Mulele Mwana Skills Project: ZOA provided sewing machines and training in vocational skills to orphaned youths in a depressed area of Lusaka. It supplied emergency funds to cover examination fees students needed to graduate. With the help of ZOA funds, the Project became a recognized Examination Center.

Canaan Center: ZOA provided school supplies and tuition for forty-five resident children.

Kwasha Mukwenu (Help your neighbour): ZOA funds supported a women's community group that provides schooling, food and medical assistance to about 2000 orphans who are in foster homes or orphan-headed households.

Ipusukilo Street Women Rehabilitation Project: ZOA funding for their vocational training program provided sewing machines, materials and shop rental for their vocational training program.

St. Anthony Children's Village: Thanks to the tithing earmarked by members of a Fairfax County church, ZOA contributes significantly to this home for infants born of AIDS-infected mothers. If they prove to be healthy, they are transferred to the Twapia Home where schooling is accessible; if not, they continue to be well cared for in the village.

Namwala Children in Distress: ZOA provided ten sewing machines and supplies for their vocational training program.

Muzuzika Orphans and Vulnerable Children Project: The project, which was started by a group of retired people in a remote part of Eastern Province, cares for about 400 orphans and vulnerable children. ZOA contributed to a piggery project in which a pair of pigs was installed when construction was completed.

Yavwenu Orphanage, Transit and Outreach Organization: ZOA funds support the gardening project of this group that runs a community school, providing food and medical care for over 100 orphans.

Ndekeleni Development Foundation: ZOA funds developed a poultry-raising project to support the subsistence, educational and health needs of AIDS orphans, of whom there are about 500 in the area.

Mkushi Pentecostal Outreach Church: ZOA is funding a hammer mill project of which the profits will support the basic needs of vulnerable children and provide essential support to the relatives who care for them

Mbuyoti and Sepiso: In an extremely poor rice-growing region of remote Western Province ZOA sent small initial grants to purchase school supplies for AIDS orphans and vulnerable children.
